Unlimited use of 8 Hakone-area transportation modes  
 ① Hakone Tozan Line ② Hakone Tozan Bus ③ “KANKO SHISETSU-MEGURI” Bus (Tourist-Attraction Sightseeing Bus/Hakone Tozan Bus) ④ Hakone Tozan Cable Car ⑤ Hakone Ropeway ⑥ Hakone Sightseeing Cruise ⑦ Odakyu Hakone Highway Bus ⑧ Tokai Bus Orange Shuttle

\*Unlimited use of ②, ⑦ and ⑧ only within designated zones shown on map. \*Cannot be used on transport other than ① to ⑧ or on scheduled sightseeing buses. \*For ⑦, passengers with reserved seats have priority. No boarding if all seats are occupied.

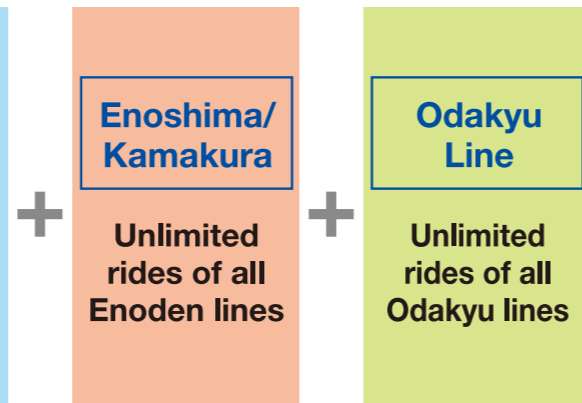
If you show your pass at any of approximately 90 designated facilities in the Hakone, Enoshima and Kamakura areas, you will receive preferential treatment such as discounts.

 \*Regardless of what time you start using the pass, the period of validity will end when transport operating hours end on the third day.

**[Notes regarding usage]** 1. The Hakone Kamakura pass can only be used by the person whose name is written on the pass. 2. Please get your pass stamped when using a pass for the first time at the ticket gate of each operator. 3. Please show your Hakone Kamakura pass in a way that allows the staff to see the period of validity when you pass through each ticket gate. 4. Since it is only valid for the person with his/her name on it, be sure to carry documents that prove your identity in case station staff request them. 5. If you ride beyond designated areas, you will have to pay the extra fare. 6. This pass does not cover Limited Express Romancecars. To ride one, you must pay a surcharge for a limited express ticket (reserved seat ticket). 7. When you are done traveling and no longer need the ticket, please return it to a staff member.

**[Notes regarding refunds]** 1. We cannot refund fares after you have started using it. 2. We refund the amount after deducting refund fee, only if you have not used it at all and request a refund within the period of validity. 3. Transportation services maybe cancelled in case of bad weather. If service has been cancelled, you may apply for a refund at the Odakyu Sightseeing Service Center.

**[Notes regarding purchase]** 1. You can buy the pass up to one month before the first day of use. 2. You can purchase a pass at the Odakyu Sightseeing Service Center, Shinjuku west.

 (Odakyu Line, Shinjuku Station/West Exit on the first floor)

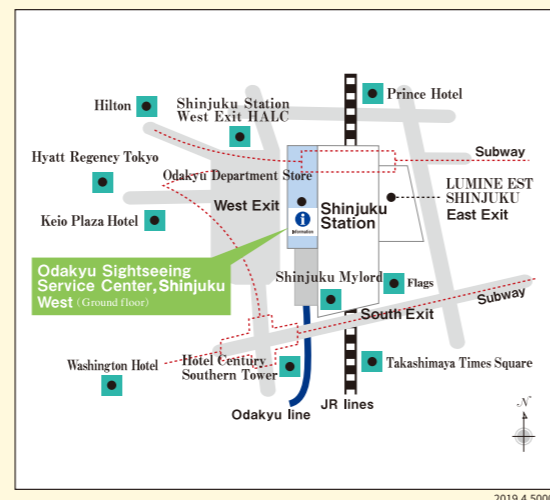

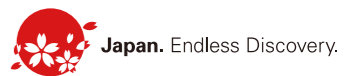

## Hakone area



### 1 Lake Ashi

Lake Ashi, symbol of Hakone. On clear days, World Heritage Site Mt. Fuji is visible from Hakonemachi-ko and Motohakone-ko ports.



### 2 Owakudani

Ride the Hakone Ropeway for a stunning view of Mt. Fuji and the smoldering valley below. Also enjoy eating black egg which is said to extend your life by 7 years for each one you eat.



### 3 Hakone Yuryo

This traditional hot-spring resort offers one of the largest private open-air baths in the greater Tokyo area as well as meals cooked on a hearth and various relaxing facilities.



### 4 Hakone-jinja Shrine

Reputedly founded in 757, this shrine is where the Tokugawa and other samurai families worshipped. Its red torii gate is visible on the shore of Lake Ashi.



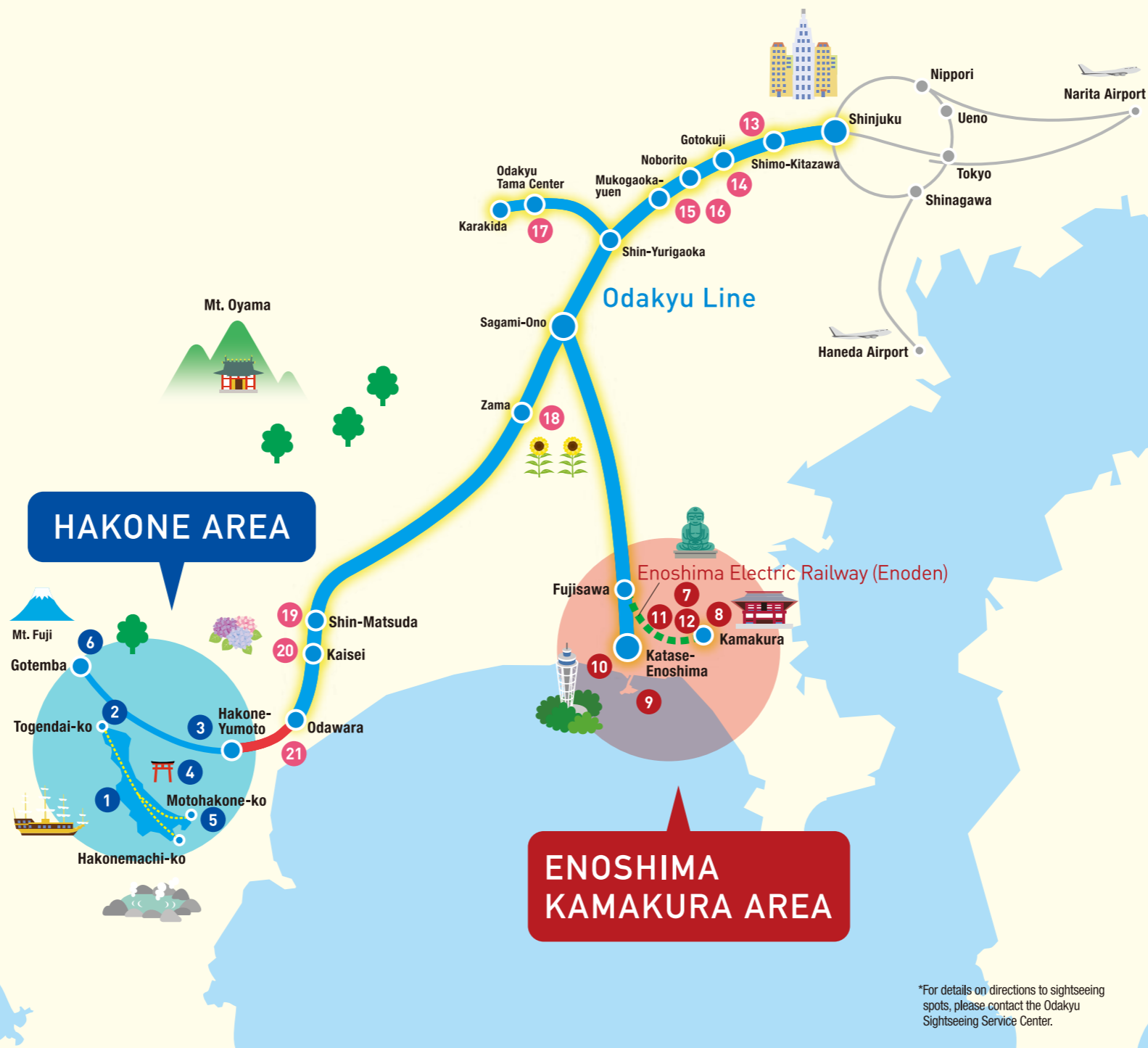
### 5 Cedar Avenue

Back in the Edo period when people traveled by foot, cedar trees were planted along this road for about 2km to provide travelers with shade from the sun and shelter from snow.



### 6 Gotemba Premium Outlets®

One of Japan's largest outlet malls, it features roughly 210 domestic and overseas prominent brand shops.



## Enoshima Kamakura area



### 7 Kotoku-in temple

This temple is famous for its colossal Great Buddha of Kamakura, which is 11.312 meters tall and can be entered by visitors.



### 8 Tsurugaoka Hachimangu shrine

Deeply associated with Minamoto no Yoritomo, the first shogun of the Kamakura shogunate, this shrine offers sightseeing spots including the main Shinto shrine and Maiden open pavilion. Visitors come to pray for good health, fulfillment, matchmaking and protection from misfortune.



### 9 Enoshima Sea Candle

The symbol of Enoshima Island, this 60 meters tall lighthouse observation tower offers a beautiful 360-degree panoramic view that takes in Mt. Fuji, the Tanzawa mountain range and Izu Oshima on sunny days.



### 10 Enoshima Aquarium

This wide-open aquarium facing Shonan Coast offers a variety of attractions, including dolphin shows, sardines shoaling in Big Sagami Bay Tank and fantastic jellyfish shows.



### 11 Enoshima Electric Railway

Passengers can enjoy spectacular views of Mt. Fuji, and of the sea, from the train windows; the sunset at Enoshima is also really beautiful. Although the line is relatively short, it is very atmospheric, so taking the train is an enjoyable experience in itself.



### 12 Hase-dera temple

Many tourists visit this temple for the scenic view from its observation deck and enjoy the surrounding hydrangeas and sweet flags in early summer.

## Recommended tourist spots along Odakyu Line



### 13 Shimo-Kitazawa

The town of Shimo-Kitazawa is popular among young generations for its unique stores in fashion and dining. Moreover, there are many theaters and live music clubs.



### 14 Gotokuji

This temple is renowned for its myriad maneki-neko figurines, which are enshrined as lucky charms in remembrance of a temple cat that helped a feudal lord evade a thunderstorm in the Edo period.



### 15 Kawasaki municipal Nihon Minka-en museum

Traditional country cottages in this park include Important Cultural Assets from the Edo period. Visitors can also enjoy a soba noodle restaurant and dango dumpling shop.



### 16 Fujiko-Fujiu Museum in Kawasaki

Dedicated to the work of cartoonist Fujiko-Fujiu, this museum includes reproduced versions of his workplace (inside) and a famous vacant lot that often appears in his work (on the roof).

Note: Advance reservation is required. Tickets are not sold at the museum.



### 17 Sanrio Puroland

Interact with Hello Kitty and other popular Sanrio characters at this all-indoor theme park. Full-blown musicals and parades entertain children as well as adults.



### 18 Sunflower fields in Zama

Every year from late July to mid August, approximately 550,000 blooming sunflowers provide an impressive scene for visitors.



### 19 Matsudayama Herb Garden

Enjoy rolling hills of colorful herbs all year around. Or visit as early as mid February to witness the splendid contrast of Kawazu- cherry blossoms and yellow canola flowers.



### 20 Kaisei Hydrangea village

In early summer, the rice fields in this village are surrounded by pink and purple hydrangeas that attractively contrast with the green rice paddies.



### 21 Odawara Castle Park tower

Visit this leading Odawara landmark in one of Japan's top 100 historical parks, where flowers flourish and numerous events are held throughout the year.
